DR. CHRISTINA MUMMA: A CAREER OF PROFESSIONAL EXCELLENCE

In 2005, Dr. Mumma retired after a 15 years career as a member of the UAA nursing faculty. During that time, she taught and mentored students at the baccalaureate and graduate levels, serving for several years as Chair of the Graduate Committee. At the undergraduate level, Dr. Mumma has had a hand in the educational preparation of nearly 1000 newly licensed RNs, having taught courses as both beginning (pathophysiology and nursing fundamentals) and advanced levels (research, medical-surgical nursing) levels within the curriculum.

At the graduate level, she set the tone, often mentoring faculty as they made the transition from undergraduate to graduate teaching. And, since 1989 when she joined the UAA faculty, she had touched virtually every graduate student who has enrolled in nursing course work through her teaching of nursing theory and nursing research. Dr. Mumma's excellence as a teacher was recognized by her students, who rated her teaching as being well above the norm; by UAA, in her receipt of the Chancellor's Award for Teaching Excellence in 1999; by the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching in naming her the Alaska Professor of the Year in 1999; by NurseWeek, which awarded her a regional Nursing Excellence Award for Teaching in 2001; and in 2005 by UAA, with her appointment to emeritus status.

It could reasonably be argued that Dr. Mumma introduced the concept of qualitative nursing research to Alaska. In addition to teaching the Qualitative Nursing Research course to UAA graduate nursing students, Dr. Mumma also mentored many faculty members in integrating the richness of the personal experiences of research informants into their research. In her own research career, Dr. Mumma has been involved in a longitudinal study of the quality of life of individuals living with multiple sclerosis; in the process of carrying out that research, Dr. Mumma developed valuable insights that have the potential for affecting care while simultaneously "giving voice" to the individuals who live with an often devastating illness.



During the past five years, Dr. Mumma has expanded her work into a consideration of the lives of women aging with chronic illness. That expansion was accomplished in partnership with a colleague on the nursing faculty; together, they collected and analyzed data and disseminated the results of their work. In the process they made numerous presentations at regional, national and international levels and published a manuscript in a refereed journal.

It is also reasonable to describe Dr. Mumma as the most published nurse in the history of Alaska. Even before she arrived in the state, she was the editor of the Core Curriculum of the Rehabilitation Nurses Association, had authored or co-authored articles in at least four refereed nursing journals, and authored a chapter in a Neuroscience Nursing textbook. She continued to be prolific after she relocated to Alaska. Since 1989, she has authored no fewer than six chapters in various neuroscience, rehabilitation nursing, and medical-surgical nursing textbooks and she authored or co-authored three refereed nursing journal articles. During the same times frame (1989-2005), she gave 17 scholarly presentations at refereed regional, national or international conferences.

Dr. Mumma's scholarship represents both the discovery and dissemination of new knowledge as well and an extension of her teaching to audiences well beyond Alaska's borders.

It was because of her substantial influence on nursing in Alaska and in the West, that Dr. Mumma was inducted into the Western Academy of Nursing in 2003. It is because of her long and laudable career, which has been filled with documented evidence of professional excellence, that she was selected as the 2007 recipient of the Theta Omicron Professional Excellence Award.

Christine Walrath, a Registered Nurse, working in the Progressive Care Unit (PCU) at Providence Alaska Medical Center (PAMC) was nominated from the professional community. She was inducted into Sigma Theta Tau, Theta Omicron Chapter on April 19, 2007. Christine was nominated because she demonstrates



the qualities and characteristics of a Nurse Leader. Her achievements include:

2004 -Graduate, University of Alaska School of Nursing, BSN.

2004 -Hired by PAMC in the PCU.

2005 - Nominated by nurse managers for the March of Dimes Nurse of the Year Award.

2006 - Submission of a research proposal that asked the question “Is our new teaching tool for nurses taking care of kidney patients effective? to the Evidence Based Practice/Research Council at PAMC.

2006 -Awarded grant from PAMC to attend an evidence based practice immersion program at Arizona State University in June, 2007.

2006-Co-Chair PCU Council.

2006-Preceptor, PCU Nurse Intern Program

2007-Attained PCCN Certification.

A former Graphic Designer for twelve years, Christine described why she made a life change to become a nurse. “I chose nursing because it is more in-line with my personal beliefs. Human to human interaction and humanity were lacking for me in graphic design. Connecting with patients and their families and being able to impact them in the smallest of ways is a true honor. Nursing is an intellectual challenge for me every day. I enjoy the satisfaction that doing my job well provides.
